Summer cruise 2013

After frustratingly losing the first day to bad weather resulting in not having enough time for the planned visit to Chatham, the cruise got underway on Sunday in much improved conditions with 10 boats heading for the River Medway.

After an overnight stop at Queenborough 8 boats including *Dreamcatcher, Krystal jak, Bacchante, Attila, Samphire, Tripper, Footloose* and *Mirari (Permata* and *Miss Clare* electing to stay on the Medway and Swale) then enjoyed a downwind sail up the Thames to St Katharine's Dock for a three night stay. After passing notable landmarks such as the new London gateway container port, QE2 Bridge, Thames barrier and Millennium dome the first boats tied up on the waiting buoys outside St Kath's at 16.45, 2 hours ahead of schedule.

It was quite a bumpy wait for the first lock into the marina at 18.30 due to the chop caused by the pleasure boats and river taxis.

Two sunny days in London allowed us to take the river bus to Greenwich with visits to the Cutty Sark, Royal Observatory and Maritime Museum with

the second day taken up with shopping, a day on HMS *Belfast* or a visit to the Tower of London. The last evening in St Kath's was spent with everyone enjoying a dinner at the Dickens Inn overlooking the harbour followed by drinks back on the boats, with half of us ending up on the back of Gerry's boat!!!!!!!!!!

We left St Kath's on a grey and murky Thursday morning with



very little wind coming from the east which meant motoring all the way back to Queenborough, even for Gerry! Unfortunately a couple of boats suffered engine problems with *Footloose* having to be towed into Thurrock YC moorings due to a fuel line blockage. Fortunately John was able to remedy the problem and carry on. Well done to Alan on *Mirari* for the tow.

Next almost at the same time was Alan on *Tripper* who suffered overheating problems probably due to the fact he was running almost flat out and steaming along at 10kn!!!!!! Once he backed off a bit all alarms cleared and no further problems arose.

It was 17.30 when the first boats arrived at Queenborough where we all moored on the 'concrete Lighter' which allowed us to hop on and off each other's boats



for yet more drinks. Also there we met up again with *Permata* and *Miss Clare* who had enjoyed their time on the Medway and Swale.

Friday morning saw us sailing back home with a good SW breeze giving some of us the chance to break out the spinnaker with a downwind run to the Whitaker and a beat up the Crouch.



This year's cruise was a great success with some good sailing and even better company.

Tips from our Mooring Officer

URYC One and two at Manor Park SC

In April, the Lightning fleet gathered at Manor Park SC in Staffordshire, starting the 2013 Grand Prix season in style with a training day on Saturday and Championship racing on Sunday.

With a bright and frosty start, the wind gods certainly weren't with us in the morning and a short on the water postponement was inevitable as R.O. David Norris waited valiantly for any sort of breeze for us.

Eventually, a whisper started to establish itself and all credit to Dave for managing to get courses set with the wind coming and going in patches. It was going to be a challenging day for all parties with much discussion of 'wind shift lottery' later in the clubhouse.

In race 1, with 23 boats, a short line and a very port bias, being on the front

row was going to be paramount.

First tack off into clear air Simon was Matt and Hopkins who match raced up the first beat. Matt had the superior speed, boat however, and was first round



the windward mark followed by Simon, Paul (Dave) White, Caroline Key and leading the chasing pack much to everyone's surprise, Wayne Jenner.

The front 4 made a clear break from the pack to extend a sizable lead but none more so than Matt who sailed off into the distance to be so far ahead at the finish the next boat was several legs behind. In the battle for the minor places local Alex Shaw managed to cross the gap to join Caroline, Paul and Simon and it looked like this would have been the final order until the fleet caught some breeze to close up the entire length of the race. In the shake up on the last lap Caroline held



on for second but Penny Yarwood sailed though from nowhere to take third on the line from Paul.

Lunch was then taken with hope the breeze would stabilise for the back to back races in the afternoon.

Race 2 start was similar to race One with everyone aiming for the pin end. The breeze was more settled and on the line Matt was over but being by the pin gybed round and threaded the needle on port through the starting starboard pack to find clear air

On the right hand side of the course: Simon went left and, as in race One, they rounded the first mark side by side with Penny in close company for an Up River YC 1, 2, 3. Once again Wayne was in the leading pack chasing the front runners with Alex, Paul Beven and Adam Styles - eyebrows were raised as Wayne was sporting the new cross cut Dacron that was obviously working very well in the light airs. Simon, Matt and Penny extended their lead to the leeward mark when Simon mistakenly protected the inside for a port rounding only to realise late it was starboard and by that time Matt and Penny were through.

In the next lap Alex once again used his local knowledge of the shifts and joined in the battle with Matt and Simon. The wind gods played their hand on the next beat and Matt got caught out on the left with no wind and was caught by the chasing bunch of Rupert, Caroline and Paul from which he would not recover. On the final beat Penny had extended her lead for a fine win and Simon was easily covering Alex for second when he sailed into a hole yards from the line. Alex picked up the new breeze from the right and sailed over the top to win by about an inch (I have the video; it's painful!).

Going into the last race Penny had the lead but Matt, Alex, Caroline or Simon could take the title if they could win the last race. The wind went hard right just before the start and it was a bit of a drag race off the line and Paul led round the first mark with Matt, Alex, Simon and Penny in close pursuit. Although there was many place changes and Rupert made a storming recovery after a 720 at the start it was the final beat that decided the meeting. Paul rounded first followed by Alex. Matt having had mainsheet issues had dropped back and that was enough for him to round on a completely new wind and sail directly to the line closely followed by Penny who sneaked over inches ahead of Alex followed by Rupert. Paul who had led most of the race had to settle for 5th.

In the end, with 2 first places, Matt Hopkins added the Northern Championship Shield to his 2012 Inland title, one point ahead of Penny Yarwood both from Up River YC with Manor Park SC local Alex Shaw in third.

RNLI On Board Safety Advice



In February many of you attended the RNLI talk by Clifton Warry where he gave a demonstration about checking Lifejackets. Clifton also mentioned the On Board Safety Advice sessions. Some members have followed this up and found Clifton's input most helpful. If you were thinking of arranging a session but had not got round to it his contact details are Clifton

The RNLI offers a free, friendly and confidential service that looks at the safety aspects of your boat. Conducted by one of their highly trained volunteers, Advice Onboard is a personal, face-to-face safety advice service that takes place onboard your craft. You set the time and they tailor their visit to your vessel and the type of boating you do. Whether you're a newcomer or an experienced boater, the unique one-to-one service will give you an opportunity to ask any niggling questions on equipment or emergency procedures.



The club telephone has now been disconnected as it was very expensive to have in place and was not being used as most people now have mobile phones. If you do need to contact anyone, the telephone numbers of the Officers of the club are in your URYC Programme booklet

and on the club notice board. All Cruiser and Dinghy Members should have a copy of the Cruiser or Dinghy Register which includes members' contact details.





Clifton's demonstration showed us just how many things can go wrong with a lifejacket. Listed below is the RNLI advice for suggested regular checks:

Every month:

Check the gas cylinder is tightly screwed in

The CO₂ cylinders in lifejackets can work themselves loose and should be checked for tightness every month. Always carry re-arming kits

for each type of lifejacket you have onboard. If a lifejacket is accidentally inflated, you will then be able to get it ready for use again straight away.

Every 3 months:

Check the gas cylinder for corrosion

Check the CO₂ bottle for corrosion every 3 months. Rusty cylinders should be replaced. Also, check any areas of material that were in contact with a rusty cylinder as the fabric may have been damaged.

Check the webbing

Every 3 months, check the webbing and the stitching that holds the webbing together. A lifejacket with a colour thread that strongly contrasts with the webbing makes it much easier to spot worn stitching. While you're at it, check zips, buckles and other fastenings.

Every 6 months:

Check for leaks

Every 6 months, inflate the lifejacket manually with a hand pump (use a hand pump to prevent moisture build-up inside the lifejacket). Leave it inflated for 24 hours to ensure there are no leaks or damage. Repack the lifejacket according to the manufacturer's folding instructions.


